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Background

The *Transforming Futures: Enhancing Practice for ESD for 2030 through Action Research* project aims to generate evidence and develop technical guidance tools in critical areas of ESD and transformative education, such as **1) whole-institution approaches in ESD, 2) transversal sustainability competencies and pedagogies, and 3) learning assessment for ESD**. This project seeks to strengthen knowledge and capacity among institutions and individuals to transform educational practices that promote sustainability and quality education. It will empower education stakeholders, foster innovative teaching practices, and facilitate the integration of sustainability principles in educational institutions and systems.

This initiative is implemented through the global ESD for 2030 Network, leveraging the expertise and collaboration of UNESCO Chairs, higher education institutions and ASPnet institutions from 10 participating countries, which includes **Brazil, Costa Rica, Cote d'Ivoire, Cuba, Germany, Japan, Kenya, Malaysia, Romania and Slovenia**.

From March 2025, **43 ASPnet schools, higher education institutions, and vocational and teacher training institutes** from the participating countries have been piloting, testing, and reviewing the guidance tools. Each country has selected 3-4 schools to take part in this process. Their feedback will contribute to refining these tools, ensuring they are effective in

practice, while also generating valuable case studies and evidence on the implementation of ESD strategies. The project is generously supported by the Government of Japan.

The global symposium will take place over **two and a half days (2.5 days)** and will include sessions to share key findings, present best practices, case studies, and facilitate discussions among all participants involved in the project. The meeting will also give a platform to selected teachers who will share insights and outcomes of the project from their schools. The project will culminate with the publication of the three tools and findings of the action research by UNESCO.

Objectives and outcomes

This event will bring together participants of the project from the ten countries to share lessons learned and exchange good practices and feedback on the project and tools before their publication. In addition to fostering this dialogue, the event aims to produce tangible outcomes, including a dissemination strategy and launch event for the publication of the 3 tools, proposals for scaling the project to other schools and countries to ensure long-term sustainability, and identifying opportunities for targeted capacity-building activities. Outcomes also include a compilation of good practices and multimedia resources, such as videos, photos, and an article to showcase key insights and promote the visibility of the project.
