About Cultural Policy Yearbook – A Continued Vision

Serhan Ada, UNESCO Chair in Cultural Policy and Cultural Diplomacy

One of the main objectives of higher education for sustainability is to nurture holistic conceptions of sustainability in students, so that they can use sustainability as an approach to analyze and solve complex problems in their future professional fields. This study offers a first systematic examination of how students' sustainability conceptions change during their course of study. We used a longitudinal survey, with two cohorts of n=2930 students, in 4 programmes of study, operating over five years, with multiple survey inputs by each student. This best practice session on the results of the study discusses the underlying theoretical and practical implications for teaching approaches in higher education for sustainable development.

Cultural Policy Yearbook (CPY) is a peer reviewed periodical compiled by Istanbul Bilgi University Cultural Policy and Management Research Centre (KPY) and the UNESCO Chair in Cultural Policy and Cultural Diplomacy, published annually by Iletisim Publishing in both English and Turkish, separately since 2009. Biosphere reserves as learning territories for regenerative development

The GIS-Station – a competence center for digital geo-media and interlinkage between research and education

Tobias Matusch, UNESCO Chair on World Heritage and Biosphere Reserve Observation and Education The UCI UNESCO Chair on Biosphere Reserves and natural World Heritage Sites works closely with the biosphere reserves of Central and South America, strengthening the management capacities of institutional and local actors. Inspired by the work of the Chair within biosphere reserves, the university is working on developing methodologies, programmes and projects to put regenerative development approach into practice at the bioregional level.

The GIS-Station, celebrating its 10th anniversary next year, is a competence center for digital geo-media. Since its foundation in 2009, the GIS-Station combines innovative research and education, produces manifold courses as well as education concepts and has carried out more than 1,000 events. With their interdisciplinary orientation, these events addressed different target groups, e.g. pupils, students, teachers, and multipliers.

International Conservation Summer Academy @ Pompeii - A grassroots approach to teaching conservation

Ralf Kilian, Fraunhofer IBP Anne Becker, Fraunhofer IMW In an ongoing research project, the UNESCO Chair in Heritage Studies focuses on local sites of remembrance that represent colonial and socialist traces in the city of Cottbus. The project is based on the methodology of postcolonial history workshops (Geschichtswerkstätten) which we developed during a teaching/research project with students and members of the civil society. The highlighting of colonial and socialist traces is an important contribution to the sustainable development goals because it promotes impulses to build a peaceful and inclusive city by creating spaces for oral, shared and marginalized histories.

Since 2012 several leading institutions from archaeology, geology and conservation work together to organize international conservation academies of the Pompeii Sustainable Preservation Project in the Gulf of Naples region. Pompeii itself is an ideal ground for teaching conservation of ancient monuments by addressing all the challenges posed by preserving the ancient site and by learning from conservation practices with a tradition of over 250 years.

How to build a sustainable platform for SDG education, innovation and impact?

Katrin Redmann, SAP University Alliances & NextGen Innovation Hub In this Think Tank we change perspective: The 17 UN GlobalGoals are no longer targets to achieve, we turn them into challenges. We create prototypes and design their impact.

SDG 4 meets SDG 16 – The transnational project "Exploring Visual Cultures"

Paul-Henri Souvenir Assako Assako, Department of Arts and Archeology Patrique deGraft-Yankson, Department of Art and Design Education Esther Kibuka-Sebetosi, Institute for African Renaissance Studies Ernst Wagner, UNESCO Chair in Arts and Culture in Education African and European universities collaborate in the project "Exploring Visual Cultures". The project's goal is to develop teaching materials that ensure quality education (SDGs, Goal 4) through global partnership (Goal 17). In a first step we define visual objects (art works, design, media, architecture, crafts, symbols etc.) that are relevant in education and that allow to address SDGs in the classroom. In the second step multi-perspective interpretations and artistic responses, exchanged between the partners will deepen the intercultural dialogue in order to promote educational innovation in a globalized world.

WaSec - Innovative Educational Tools for the Sustainable Water Management and Water Security in the Eastern Mediterranean

George Zaimes, UNESCO Chair con-e-ect: Promoting conservation in riparian and deltaic ecosystems

Water is a Catalyst for Collaboration and Achieving the SGDs: The Case of GFRD

Hani Sewilam, UNESCO Chair in Hydrological Change and Water Resources Management The WaSec project brings together and strengthens the cooperation between companies and universities through the development of new courses in Water Resources Management, while taking into consideration potential climate change impacts, with adaptive learning and teaching methods for the Eastern Mediterranean region. So we will present the lessons that we have learned from this intermtaional project that are applicable in other similar project.

The Grand Ethiopian Renaissance Dam (GERD) is the biggest hydropower dam in Africa. The GERD will have a significant impact on the Eastern Nile System in terms of water control which could create conflict in the region. The presentation will focus on the possible solution and its relation to achieving the SDGs.

Using heritage to achieve sustainability: "Our Collections Matter"

Ambre Tissot, International Centre for the Study of the Preservation and Restoration of Cultural Property

Sustainable Food Futures: Best practices in the study and reform of food systems

Thomas Reuter, Asia Institute, University of Melbourne

Sustainable development is a key objective of ICCROM, and the organization has adapted its programmes and activities accordingly. One particular example is "Our Collections Matter", a new prospective activity that will be implemented during the next biennium (2020-21). This activity seeks to enable organisations responsible for heritage collections to use them in practical ways to advance the sustainable development goals (e.g. through educating on climate action, developing green museums, supporting local economies, strengthening social cohesion and inclusion of marginalised groups). This project relies on a strong collaboration both inside and outside the heritage sector, as it aims at demonstrating the prominent role of culture for development.

Deteriorating environmental growing conditions, increasing demand and increasing inequality together produce mounting food security risks in many countries. The mainstream recommendation, promoted by agro-science, corporations, many international development agencies and the state, is to enhance capital investment, technology and market access, which favours the growth of corporate land holdings and profit oriented production. The better but still alternative approach, shared by small-farmers organisations, NGOs and social science researchers, tends toward solutions grounded in local knowledge, sustainable farming, and local systems of distribution and consumption.
